Exploring Our Sunday Morning Liturgies

A few people have commented recently about the various liturgies we've been using in the past couple of years. The questions have been a good reminder to me that it is good to continue to teach about worship and the choices we make that give shape to our Sunday mornings. We are blessed to have a musical congregation that enjoys variety.

Lutherans have many resources available to help us worship in many styles. Sometimes we use what some of us consider to be the traditional liturgy, a liturgy once found in the green Lutheran Book of Worship. At other times we use more contemporary styles, singing settings of Evangelical Lutheran Worship. We recently spent time with a contemporary setting from *With One Voice*. The various styles and melodies we use help us keep worship fresh and reflective of seasonal themes. A more solemn approach to liturgy is often sung during Lent, while a more energetic version is sung during the Sundays of Easter.

Worship on Sundays is rooted in the historical roots of the church. When we gather each week, we worship God in ways that are central to the church for hundreds of years. The words we use, some of the tunes we sing, the order in which we do things, is a reflection of what God does for us.

Liturgy in historic Christian churches follows a typical pattern developed in the early church. It has four basic sections to it: Gathering, Word, Meal and Sending. "Gathering" rituals often include actions such as:

- Confession of Sin and Forgiveness
- Gathering Song
- Apostolic Greeting - using scriptural words: "The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all."
- Kyrie - in which the congregation sings "Lord have Mercy."
- A Song (canticle) of Praise
- A Prayer of the Day - which picks up on themes for the day, taken from scripture being read and the season of the church year. More will be said about the church year in a while.

The second section of worship is "Word." During the Word section of the service, the congregation is called to hear and proclaim the Word of God. A typical pattern for this is:

- First lesson - a reading from the Old Testament
- Psalm - a scriptural psalm (song) whose themes are connected with the first lesson
- Second lesson - a reading from the New Testament letters (epistles)
- The Holy Gospel - Most often, the gospel is preceded by a sung "Alleluia," which is the church's word for celebration. The Alleluia celebrates Jesus the Christ who comes to the congregation as the Word of God proclaimed in the gospel. Sometimes this Alleluia is repeated after the Gospel is read.

- Then comes the Sermon or Homily, which is considered an extension of the scripture read. During the sermon, the preacher expounds on the scriptures read, announcing the Gospel (the good news of God's love in Christ) and law (the impacts the scriptures have on our daily living.)

- A song follows the sermon. It picks up the themes of the scriptures and sermon.
- Having heard the Word, the congregation responds with words of faith, saying I or We believe, using one of the creeds, either the Apostles' or Nicene.
- Having declared, their faith, the congregation then turns to the concerns of neighbor and world and lifts its voice in the prayers of intercession.

The third section is "meal." Churches that practice weekly communion will typically do the following in this section:

- Gather an offering as a gift to God to be used for the ministry of the church
- Enter into the "Great Thanksgiving" in which the church ritually gives thanks to God. The Great Thanksgiving involves ancient words of the Church. Sometimes this section of the Meal will include:

A dialogue of thanksgiving

A preface that emphasizes the work of God and turns the congregation toward praise

A sung "Sanctus" or Holy, Holy, Holy – this is a hymn of praise in which the congregation joins the angels of heaven in praising God.

A Eucharistic Prayer – Eucharist means thanksgiving. In the Eucharistic prayer, the Presiding Minister leads the congregation to remember mysteries of God while giving thanks for all God does. The high point of this praise comes in the Words of Institution in which the priest or pastor announces the central mysteries of the meal: that on the night of his betrayal, our Lord Jesus Christ used bread and wine and offered them to his people and declared the promise that He is present in the bread and wine for those gathered, for the forgiveness of sin.

Then the congregation enters into the Lord's prayer before making their way to the altar to receive the bread and wine of the meal – the presence of Jesus – his body in the bread and his blood in the wine.

- Following the Communion, the meal comes to an end with a sung response and a prayer.

The final section of a liturgical service is "Sending." This section does exactly what the name suggests. It sends the people into the world, reminding them that they have been fed twice: by the Word of God and by the presence of Jesus in the meal. It often does this through the following actions:

- A sending song is sung, often summarizing themes from the day, or praising God for gifts given.
- A benediction is proclaimed over the congregation – a benediction is a spoken blessing in which the pastor or priest declares a performative word, a word that performs an action. In this case it is a word that performs a blessing.
- Finally, the congregation is sent out with words of dismissal and praise.

Evangelical Lutheran Worship, our hymnal, provides many options for musical expression of these movements. Formally, there are ten musical settings for the liturgy. There are dozens of alternatives for each liturgy. We also have available resources from other Lutheran settings found the church, such as With One Voice and other formally prepared liturgies. Many congregations write their own settings. Some use musical settings provided by other Christian denominations, while a few borrow music from secular sources to provide melodies to ancient words.

Unfamiliar Hymn?

The joy of worship music is that there is a myriad of music for use in worship. Sometimes you may not know the hymn being sung. 95% of the songs we sing in worship are from Evangelical Lutheran Worship, the red hymnal in our pews. If you don't know the tune of the song being sung and/or would like to see music as you sing, you can find hymn numbers in two places: in the bulletin and on the title screen for the hymn being sung. Here are a couple more hints for you when learning new music in worship: 1) Listen to the introduction. Mark generally introduces the key melody lines in the introduction; and 2) Listen for Mark's leadership as you sing the song. He does a good job of leading people through the music by emphasizing melody lines in what he plays/leads. His music will help you learn an unfamiliar hymn.

New Interim President of Family Promise Waukesha: It's Somebody You Know

In May, President Marjore Thompson's time as Family Promise Waukesha came to an end. She served on the board faithfully, shepherding the organization to become what we are today: An organization poised to solidify itself for the future. I was elected as the board's interim president (Interim is the designation I insisted on using). As president, I convene and lead Board and Executive Committee meetings, while supporting Family Promise's Executive Director.

Family Promise is at an important crossroads. We are in our fourth year of active ministry. This is the time in which an organization normally solidifies its structure, goals, and other organizational support systems to help it transition itself into a stable organization.

Christ the King is an important leader in Family Promise of Waukesha County. We are one of 13 host churches. CTK's Family Promise Volunteer Coordinators (Jennie Marquardt, Shelly Fuller, and Vicky Jaeger) are regularly engaged in leadership meetings. Our congregation is recognized as an extremely committed partner. Deane Jaeger is one of Family Promises' most dependable volunteers. He drives the FP van several times each week. Vicky Jaeger serves on FPW's Program Committee. My involvement in Family Promise is not to be considered an extra activity or outside distraction to the pastor, but a ministry of "walking alongside" our congregation's commitment to be engaged in Family Promise. In serving, I am serving alongside many of people from our congregation, using my leadership gifts to help homeless folks.

ELCA Presiding Bishop, Faith Leaders Issue Statement On Family Separation

CHICAGO (June 7, 2018) – The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, presiding bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), has convened ELCA ecumenical and inter-religious partners in a statement addressing concerns over a recent U.S. government policy calling for more stringent enforcement of federal immigration laws. The policy will most likely result in an increase in family separations.

The letter follows:

Recently, the Administration announced that it will begin separating families and criminally prosecuting all people who enter the U.S. without previous authorization. As religious leaders representing diverse faith perspectives, united in our concern for the wellbeing of vulnerable migrants who cross our borders fleeing from danger and threats to their lives, we are deeply disappointed and pained to hear this news.

We affirm the family as a foundational societal structure to support human community and understand the household as an estate blessed by God. The security of the family provides critical mental, physical and emotional support to the development and wellbeing of children. Our congregations and agencies serve many migrant families that have recently arrived in the United States. Leaving their communities is often the only option they have to provide safety for their children and protect them from harm. Tearing children away from parents who have made a dangerous journey to provide a safe and sufficient life for them is unnecessarily cruel and detrimental to the well-being of parents and children.

As we continue to serve and love our neighbor, we pray for the children and families that will suffer due to this policy and urge the Administration to stop their policy of separating families.



Synod Assembly Recap and Resolutions

The 2018 Synod Assembly was a great event challenging each of us to be curious, compassionate and courageous. Char Hall, Andy Justman and I were Voting Members to the assembly. More information about the synod assembly can be found at: <https://milwaukeesynod.org/synod-assembly-2018/>

Note the language used to describe us. We went not as delegates or representatives, but as Voting Members. The Synod Assembly is made up of people with this title, to remind us that we gather from across the synod to follow the lead of the Holy Spirit who is at work in and among the church (and Synod Assembly is Church) wherever it is. To be free to follow the lead the Spirit, each congregation sends Voting members who are encouraged to pray about topics under discussion, to listen to discussion on the floor, and to vote according to how the Spirit leads. Voting members do not represent the congregation. They do not vote on behalf of the congregation, but according to their perception of the Spirit's call during the Assembly.

The synod assembly discussed and acted many mission-related topics. The following is a brief synopsis.

- Our Synod continues to be dedicated to leading each other to examine the roots and continuing impacts of racism in American society and local congregations. Thursday night, we heard a compelling and moving presentation from Reggie Jackson, Griot of the American Black Holocaust Museum in Milwaukee. He helped voting members think about Milwaukee's history and how it has contributed to poverty, poor education, violence, and continuing segregation in the greater Milwaukee area. - Resolution 1 called on the Congregations of the Greater Milwaukee Synod to continue to embrace the synod's identity as a "Reconciling in Christ (RIC) Synod" that is committed to the work "equality and full inclusion of people of all sexual orientations and gender identities in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America." The synod currently has 24 congregations that identify as RIC congregations. The assembly encouraged them to live out their RIC identity fully while engaging neighboring congregations who are not RIC congregations, to encourage them to consider participating in the RIC process. The assembly also asked congregations who are not RIC congregations to consider engaging synod staff about their congregational identities. The assembly also asked the Synod staff to work with the synod RIC Ministry Team to provide training and resources for interim pastors to help congregations in transition. To see the full resolution visit the Synod Website, or ask Pastor Jordan for a copy of the resolution.
- Resolution 2 called for expanded support of the prison congregation, a ministry for people re-entering society after prison/Jail and active advocacy for prison reform. In particular, the resolution encouraged all congregations to support Breaking the Chains Congregation, by sending volunteers to participate in the Saturday evening worship and Wednesday evening Bible class. It also encouraged congregations to invite Pastor Mark Thompson to speak/Preach at congregations. This resolution also encouraged congregations to support and participate in the reentry ministry of Project RETURN and in the prison reform campaign, Restoring our Communities.
- Many elections were held, filling spots on various committees and electing people to attend the 2019 Churchwide Assembly being held in Milwaukee, August 2019.
- The 2019 budget was also approved.

Parking Lot Express News!

The final asphalt layer (2" thick) will be scheduled after the landscape restoration is completed.

Landscape restoration - the dirt areas on the site are very wet and at this point cannot be graded. So there may be a number of days of no work taking place. Once the ground is dry enough P&D will return to place topsoil and finish grade the planting and lawn areas. After that, seed and erosion mat will be placed.

While waiting for the landscaping, the entire lot will be available for use... enjoy!
